Construction Update

The transformation of the Willcox Building is quite amazing. When the building was first emptied, the extent of the need for renovation was quite apparent. Nabholz, our contractor on this project, has moved well beyond the demolition stage, and we are forging ahead in the construction phase. I am certain you will be pleased with the end product. I am not certain that you will recognize the building as being the same one we began with.

Watching Nabholz and the crew of subcontractors they have assembled reinforces the wise decision that Philip Tappan and his committee made when they selected Nabholz



as our general contractor. Current expectations are to finish on time for the Day School to move in and start the fall semester on September 7. Scott Smith, our architect, has finished the plans for the renovation of the Youth Hall downstairs. If the bids come in as anticipated, we will probably see asbestos abatement work start in that space the first week of July.

Work continues on the roofing project, but is controlled by the work schedule of the asbestos abatement contractor, which, in turn, is controlled by the weather. Any time the weather forecast calls for a 20% or greater chance of rain, they can't work due to the risk of uncovering roof surface that cannot be re-roofed immediately. The abatement contractor works at night, and the roofers come in and roof over the exposed areas the next day.

In closing, I would be remiss if I did not remind everyone that *it is critical that you stay current on your capital campaign pledge*. The next two months will see a very heavy outflow of funds, since this is a short term project. I would also urge anyone who has not made a commitment to this campaign to do so, either now, or after you see the finished product. The transformation of these two buildings will make a huge difference in our ability to serve both our congregation and our community. If you have any questions regarding the project, please don't hesitate to contact me.

Rector's Reflections

Fr. Danny has been granted permission from author Jerome Kodell, O.S.B., to use portions of his book, *Twelve Keys to Prayer*, for this column during Danny's sabbatical. We resume where we stopped last month.

3) *Involuntary distractions do not interrupt prayer.* As a decision, prayer is primarily an action of the will, not of the mind. The mind, constantly aggressive for thoughts and ideas, may momentarily take our attention away from the focus of our prayer without breaking the commitment to pray at that moment. The fervor of prayer is not measured by the clarity of the focus, but by the intensity of the desire. An involuntary distraction no more breaks our communication of love with God than the spontaneous thought of their child during a kiss breaks the expression of love between husband and wife.

This means that we may spend a good part of the time set aside for prayer in fighting distractions. As long as we are still fighting, the prayer is uninterrupted because the decision is unbroken. We may end our prayer not really knowing what we have done with our time, though we have intended to pray the whole time, and every attempt at prayer is prayer.

There is satisfaction and a kind of control in knowing what we have done in prayer. If distractions lead us to lay down this control trusting in God's mercy, rather than being an obstacle they will serve as a means to pure prayer.

4) *Prayer is not a matter of thinking but of loving.* To put it in the words of St. Teresa of Avila: "The important thing is not to think much but love much." This statement does little more than throw into relief much of what has already been said. It does contrast prayer and thinking rather than prayer and feeling as in the preceding number. Locating prayer in the will puts us all on an equal footing before God, no matter what our differences in intellectual gifts. We can all love. And the knowledge of love is greater than the knowledge of thought. "No one can fully comprehend the uncreated God by knowledge; but each person, in a different way, can grasp him fully through love" (*The Cloud of Unknowing*, 4).

Thinking about God and the things of God is a very good preparation for prayer, but it is not prayer. The same is true of spiritual reading. Reading about the spiritual life remains preliminary, as does the reflective thinking called meditation, even when the subject is the sacred Scriptures. These practices are excellent background for prayer, but if we let them exhaust our time of prayer, meanwhile failing to move on to direct communication or communion with God, our spiritual progress may slow to a crawl. The mind will fill with ideas until it becomes heavy and bored. Smart is not necessarily holy. Instead, we must move on from holy thought to acts of love.

August Baptismal Date Offered

The Book of Common Prayer gives specific dates for baptisms, and we also have the option of offering an additional date during the year. Traditionally at St. Mark's we have offered a late summer date. This year we will have baptisms on Sunday, August 29, and there will be a meeting with clergy and godparents prior to that day. 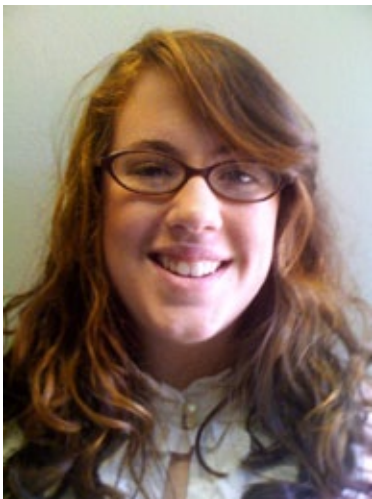

Walking the Mourner's Path

After the funeral and when friends and family go home often is when grief settles in. *Walking the Mourner's Path* is an 8 week grief group for anyone who has suffered a significant loss and would like to process it in a group setting. This is a Christ-centered bereavement support program whose purpose is to transform grief into joyful living by offering the outstretched hand of Christ during bereavement.

While this is a non-denominational ministry, it is distinct from many other bereavement programs in that it is Christ-centered, scripturally and spiritually based. *Walking the Mourner's Path* is not group therapy but is spiritually directed. We believe grieving is not lack of faith but a natural part of living. Through the eight-week program, complete with workbook, mourners learn ways in which they may honor their loved ones, seek spiritual direction and discover God's promise of comfort in community.

The group, which will meet Wednesday nights from 6-8, August 11 to September 29, is sponsored by Trinity Cathedral and will be led by facilitators Joanna Seibert, Phyllis Raney, Ann Marshall, and Anita Gwatney. Capital Campaign Update from Sr. Warden

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN ACCOUNT STATUS 5/31

One of the most important Vestry responsibilities is fiscal. During a capital campaign that responsibility includes the cash flows for the purpose of the campaign. Many of you have met the call I made last month on behalf of funding your campaign pledges and paid part of your pledge.

As you can see, we have collected approximately 23% of the total pledges made. That money is deposited in an interest-bearing checking account, with a total figure of \$408,678. Most of the expenses have been for planning and the campaign portions of our work; however, the significant cost of construction will soon appear. We closed May 31 with \$218,705 of campaign proceeds. You may have access to this data anytime you wish by emailing me (ptappan@aol.com). My thanks to the Finance Committee, especially Phil Rickels and John Ramsey, for their added oversight working with Karen Blissit and the treasurers in this important accountability of the Renewing the Vision, Embracing the Future.

July Forum Topics

The Forum in July will focus on history ... but not in the ways you may expect. We won't be talking only about dates and empires and wars but about what lessons we can learn from history in a post-9/11 world. A video series featuring Professor Rufus Spears will be the springboard for our discussions, and, although the series is not presented from a necessarily Christian point of view, the questions that arise will challenge us as Christians to respond.

July 4 *The Wisdom of History - An Overview* Professor Spears presents 10 fundamental lessons from history, including these observations: Freedom is not a universal value. Power is the universal value. The Middle East is the crucible of conflict and the graveyard of empires.

July 11 *The Wisdom of History and You* Jean Sixbey will present several ideas about how history impacts our lives and lead our discussion of Professor Spears' observations.

July 18 *Is Freedom a Universal Value?* History teaches that America has a unique legacy of freedom and one that may not be easily transplanted to other parts of the world.

July 25 *The United States and Empire* In historical terms, the consolidation and expansion of the United States paralleled the contemporaneous unification of Italy and Germany and the imperial expansion of Britain and France.
